### What is the Undergraduate Researchers Registry?

The Council on Undergraduate Research hosts a Registry of Undergraduate Researchers trained in North America who plan to attend graduate school in the U.S. The purpose of the Registry is to facilitate matchmaking between undergraduate students with research experience and a desire to pursue an advanced degree, and graduate schools seeking high quality students who are well prepared for research.

### How Does the Registry Work?

The Registry is open to students and graduate schools in the fields of Chemistry, Biology, Biochemistry, Physics/Astronomy, Psychology, Mathematics/Computer Science, Geosciences/Engineering, Sociology, and anthropology/Archeology.

Student-supplied records including the students' GPA, research experience, geographic and sub-disciplinary preferences, and other relevant information are available to bona fide graduate schools that contract with CUR for this service. The data are available electronically via a password to an online database. Organizations or companies seeking the students' information for other marketing purposes are not granted access. Graduate schools pay an annual fee of \$4500 for access to the full database, or a single department may acquire access to student data from their disciplinary field only (e.g. Chemistry/Biochemistry; Biology/Biochemistry; Physics/Astronomy; Psychology, etc.) for \$1500. Last year, the registries had 1800 accomplished students listed. Note that both chemistry and biology lists include biochemistry students.

The subscription year runs from July 1 to June 30. The contact information provided by students enable subscribing graduate departments to make direct contact with an individual they have identified as a potential candidate for their program. These targeted recruiting efforts empower individual faculty members and departments to proactively recruit students in particular area. The Undergraduate Registry Database contains a list of our institutional subscribers, if they wish to be listed. Graduate schools may provide a link to their websites, and may provide a short description of opportunities, such as research fields and fellowships. It is also possible for institutions to place an ad on the database website if the content is related to the mission of CUR and the Undergraduate Registry.
